1. January 2024: Recent Articles on Tongue Tie Treatment in the News

In the January 2024 issue of the newsletter, we featured two articles on controversies surrounding the management and treatment of ankyloglossia (tongue tie) that hit the mass media in the UK Daily Mail and The New York Times.

Many of us who work in Breastfeeding and Lactation Medicine were approached about these articles and asked to comment. ABM did respond to The New York Times article by submitting a Letter to the Editor. You can read the Letter to the Editor at The New York Times here. Why We Love It: The management of ankyloglossia has been on a bit of a pendulum journey, with that pendulum recently swinging toward more conservative and cautious treatment. The 2021 ABM Policy Statement (cited below) led the way in advocating for a more measured approach by physicians. The sensationalized mass media gave us an opportunity to circulate that message. There is more to come on ankyloglossia from ABM. We look forward to featuring future content on this subject.

2. April 2024: ABM Position Statement on Paid Maternity Leave

If you could make the rules for the entire world on parental leave, what would they be? In April, we featured the ABM position statement on parental leave (cited below) which provides a very compelling model for a fair, safe, equitable, and beneficial parental leave policy.
